OUR STATE BUDGET INCLUDES \$650 MILLION IN TAX RELIEF

- Creates a Child Tax Credit
- Cuts property taxes for retirees
- Cuts the car tax
- Extends the gas tax cut
- Extends free bus service
- Ends pension and annuity tax
 - Invests in healthcare workers

SERVING THOSE WHO SERVE US

- Guaranteed CT veterans in-state tuition rates
- Adopted higher department equipment standards, collecting better data on the prevalence of cancer among firefighters, and secured more local funding for firefighters who leave service with a cancer diagnosis
- Provided funding to local volunteer fire departments who respond to emergencies on certain state highways
- Established a new, local-option property tax exemption equal to 10% of home values for more veterans

LEADING OUR KIDS PAST THE PANDEMIC **AND TO PROMISING FUTURES**

- Provided grants to local schools to hire more support staff, including in the areas of mental health: social workers, psychologists, and counselors
- Funded the expansions of school-based health centers and the services they provide
- Created new walk-ins for mental health emergencies
- Designated a new position at the Healthcare Advocate to help families navigate care for children and adolescents
- Expanded 24/7 emergency mental health response
- Established state oversight and coordination of state response to kids' mental health needs
- Helped school-based health centers develop new mental health programming
- Provided mental health training to parents, students, and pediatricians



JUVENILE CRIME INITIATIVE

- Invested in Youth Service Bureaus and Juvenile Review Boards

- Expanded scholarships for minority teachers

FIGHTING CLIMATE CHANGE & PROTECTING CT'S ENVIRONMENT

- Created a public health reporting system for homeowners with an abundance of salt in their drinking water
- Expanded financing to develop zero emission vehicle
 - infrastructure, build more solar power and fuel cells, and
 - Expanded sophisticated testing of shellfish
 - Invested in repopulating native salmon and eel populations Explored new waste management programming
 - Created new incentives for consumer and commercial electric vehicles
- Developed a Small Harbor Improvement Projects Account to fund dredging projects
