Four Reasons Why You Should Fill Out Your Census Form

1. Money For Our Communities

An accurate count is critically important for federal funding. More than \$675 billion in federal funds are distributed annually using census numbers – that can mean about \$2200 per person in Connecticut. This money is crucial to state and local programs affecting education, housing, job creation, health care and much more. We need everyone counted so our state receives its fair share.

2. Representation And Power

The census determines how many members of Congress we will have, and federal, state and local redistricting is based on how many people are counted. This directly affects whom you can vote for and who will represent you over the coming decade, and how much influence the state and your town will have when important decisions are made affecting all of us.

3. Resources

Government, businesses, non-profits, foundations and others all rely on census data to allocate funds, make decisions affecting healthcare, economic development and jobs, deliver services, react to emergencies, develop housing and so much more. An accurate count directly affects people's jobs, health, safety and support in times of need.

4. It's Safe and Easy!

The privacy of your responses is protected by federal law. Your data is confidential, and can only be used for statistical purposes. It cannot be shared with immigration officials/ICE, law enforcement, other federal agencies or anyone else. You and those in your household will be asked about your names, address, sex, age, race and ethnicity, whether you own or rent, and relationship to each other. That's it. You will never be asked for your social security number or for any financial or political information or to make a donation. Plus for the first time, you can respond to the 2020 census online.

ENERGY SAVING TIPS

TURN DOWN YOUR THERMOSTAT

Find a comfortable temperature and keep it fixed there. Remember to turn it down at night and when you're out.

OPEN & CLOSE YOUR BLINDS

Make sure your blinds and curtains are open during the day, allowing sunlight into the house. Close blinds at night in order to trap heat.

WINTERIZE YOUR WINDOWS & DOORS

Use plastic film to cover your windows. Inspect door frames to make sure no drafts are coming into your home.

CHECK YOUR FURNACE

Clean your air filters so that your heating system works better.

USE YOUR CEILING FAN

Set your fan to blow air towards the ceiling. This will allow you to heat a room evenly.

CONTACT YOUR UTILITY COMPANY

HEATING HELP

Are you struggling? Know your rights. You can't get your heat shut off in winter. Landlords are required to keep all heating, plumbing, electricity and appliances on. You or your landlord may be responsible for water, depending on your contract. Heating must be kept at 65 degrees or above all winter.

If you have a utility shut off, contact your landlord by phone
and in writing. If your utilities are not turned back on, contact your
local Health Department or Housing Code Office, and the police
department.

WHO CAN HELP

Connecticut has heating help for people who use natural gas, electricity, oil, propane, coal, wood and wood pellets. To avoid a winter shut-off, most gas and electric utility companies offer a Winter Protection Program to low-income residents who are late paying their heating bills. For help, call United Illuminating 1-800-722-5584 / CT Natural Gas customers 860-524-8361.

ARE YOU A HOMEOWNER OR RENTER WHO PAYS SEPARATELY FOR HEAT?

If you live in a vulnerable household (one or more members are age 60 or older, are disabled, or are under age 6) then you may qualify for up to \$725 in winter heating help. If you live in a non- vulnerable household you may qualify for up to \$670 in winter heating help.

ARE YOUR HEATING COSTS INCLUDED IN YOUR MONTHLY RENT?

You may be eligible for between \$150 to \$190 in winter heating assistance depending on your household's income and size.
