

OUR BUDGET PROTECTS CONNECTICUT'S FISCAL STABILITY

- LARGEST INCOME TAX CUT in State history
- **Biggest investment in public education** ever
- Protected and expanded safety net programs

Funding for School Construction Projects	\$98.7 million
Stamford Public Education	\$20 million

KEEPING OUR COMMUNITIES SAFE

- Banned foreign governments and individuals from making contributions to CT Elections
- **Protected domestic violence victims** from being forced into debt by their abuser
- Made it a crime to harass election workers
- Required more thorough testing of firearms in criminal investigations with the use of the federal ballistic database
- Streamlined criminal background checks for prospective foster families without compromising thoroughness
- Expanded the state's investigative powers to enforce banking laws
- Banned numerous products containing dangerous PFAS chemicals
- Strengthened hospitals' defenses against cyberattacks
- Required all new bus stops to be modernized and ADA compliant
- Expanded guidelines on the use of police body cameras and require those guidelines to be included in police training

MAKING CT MORE AFFORDABLE

- Supported middle-class and working families by granting almost all full-time and part-time workers access to (mandatory) Paid Sick Days over a three-year period:
 - Use for yourself or to care for a loved one
 - Up to 40 hours per year
- Roll over time to the following year
- Required 45-day notice of rent increases
- Excluded medical debt from counting against your credit score
- Streamlined the SOTS procedure for business filings
- Expanded the small business loan program in lower-income communities and enabled more out-of-state businesses to expand into CT
- Made it easier to qualify for and receive payouts from the state's emergency mortgage assistance program







PROTECTING STAMFORD SENIORS

- care in CT
 - Required nursing homes and retirement communities to provide at least 60-90 days' notice of any fee increases and improved transparency around fees Piloting a presumptive eligibility program that will allow people

- - Cut red tape when it comes to getting wheelchairs under Medicaid and required their timely repair Banned paperwork and payment requirements for receiving critical ambulance rides



SUPPORTING VETERANS AND FIRST **RESPONDERS**

- Exempted permanently and totally disabled veterans from paying property taxes
 - Expanded eligibility for grants from the Military Relief Fund for families experiencing hardship
 - Established a Fallen Officer Fund to provide families of police officers who died in the line of duty with cash assistance and health care coverage
 - Made it easier for out-of-state nurses and social workers to move to and practice in CT
 - Strengthened oversight of negligent nursing homes
 - Prevented nursing homes from putting more than two patients in a single room
 - Created an incentive-based program to improve nursing home
 - to access home-based care in lieu of going into a nursing home (potentially saving CT \$10-20 million annually)

IMPROVING ACCESS TO HEALTHCARE

Established a new Bureau of Services for Persons who are Deaf, Deafblind, and Hard of Hearing
