This year we looked to the future and invested in parts of our community damaged by the pandemic.

Statewide, we identified children's mental health and early childcare as critical needs.

In addition, in New Haven, we expanded Latino Behavioral Health at Connecticut Mental Health Center (CMHC) and added modest increases to Neighborhood Music School and Westville Village. Also, I secured funding to begin planning and design for replacement of inadequate pipes on Forest Road which was eligible for federal infrastructure dollars.

I serve as Deputy Majority Leader, chair the health subcommittee on Appropriations, and serve on Environment and Judiciary.

PROTECTING OUR ENVIRONMENT

- New Haven: Added \$800,000 for Edgewood Park improvements
- **Clean air:** Reduced emissions from medium and heavy-duty vehicles by having 30% Zero Emissions Vehicle (ZEV) sales in Connecticut by 2030, 100% ZEV's by 2050
- **Pesticides:** Banned chlorpyrifos on golf courses due to negative impacts on children's health, and on birds, freshwater fish, and estuarine organisms
- **Fish:** Set daily catch limits on some forage and bait fish; expanded sophisticated testing of shellfish

2022 SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

- Addressed Children's Mental Health Needs
- Created Environmentally Conscious Initiatives
- Provided support to arts, museums, theaters and other attractions
- Saw PILOT funds to New Haven more than • double - from \$41.7 million to \$91.5 million



PROTECTING OUR CHILDREN

- Increased funding for infant and toddler care programs
- Funded \$2 million bonding to restore 1377 Ella Grasso Boulevard for early childcare expansion of Montessori on Edgewood
- Provided grants to local schools for support staff in mental health: social workers, psychologists and counselors
- Expanded school-based health centers
- Created new walk-ins for mental health emergencies

- Capped car taxes at 32.46 mills. New Haven is now at 43.8 mills
