We celebrated wins in housing. The 'wins' here represent only part of the housing activity. These were generated locally and supported by state funding.

I also successfully fought for new dollars for our food banks, education, and improvements to our quality of life.

In process: Federal cuts to medical research threaten innovation in bioscience, jobs, and our economy. Some cuts were reportedly restored, but it isn't clear if dollars will be released to Connecticut by the end of the year.

We are still evaluating the effects of all the Federal budget cuts on our community and our state budget. We will be tested in the coming months, but based on our teamwork this year, I am guardedly hopeful. Thank you for your activism.

BIG WINS FOR NEW HAVEN

- ◆ Progress on Affordable Housing
- ◆ Increase for Special Education

PROTECTED THE ENVIRONMENT

- Regulated the use of rodenticides.
- Set new state climate goals for greenhouse gas reduction.
- Prohibited using a pesticide that has any neonicotinoid unless the DEEP commissioner determines that there is no other effective control option.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

- We secured \$500,000 to plan a response to flooding on lower Westville Village, and I participated in the stakeholder meetings.
- City Hall has assured me the work to remedy flooding on Forest Road will move forward. Safety is at risk in severe storms, and homeowners property was damaged. Our state budget had included \$1 million in bonding.
- The bridge in Edgewood Park was repaired, improving safety. Funds were allocated by the state delegation to improve several parks.

HOUSING PROGRESS

FUNDED HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES
