GROWING OUR ECONOMY

- Cut red tape and made outdoor dining a permanent option for bars and restaurants (SB 1202)
- Created a tax-free week for restaurants (SB 1202)
- Expanded the hemp industry in CT through licensed medical marijuana providers (PA 21-37)
- Ensured fair reimbursements to mom and pop outdoor equipment dealers that perform warranty maintenance (SB 264)
- Approved self-pour beer and wine machines at CT bars (PA 21-50)
- Cut permit costs for nonprofit and private clubs, like the Army Navy Club and VFW (PA 21-10)

- Provided better and more comprehensive training and tools for police to respond to opioid overdoses (HB 1011)
- Improved mental health first aid training for paramedics so that we can more effectively diffuse difficult situations (SB 102)
- Put community violence prevention programs on a path to sustainable funding and growth in our state to serve more victims of gun violence and their families (PA 21-36)

RESPONDING TO COVID-19

- Cut Unemployment Insurance taxes on local businesses by excluding pandemic-related layoffs and paying directly into the fund (PA 21-5 & SB 1202)
- Strengthened numerous programs designed to keep people from losing their homes during tough times: Foreclosure Mediation, Lien Assistance and Emergency Mortgage Assistance (SB 891)
- Ensured legal representation if you're facing eviction (PA 21-34) .
- Increased funding to local health departments (SB 1202)
- Increased protections on homes, cars and bank accounts when someone falls into debt (HB 6466)
- Created an Unemployed Workers' Advocate to assist out-of-work residents with accessing benefits and getting back to work

Rallying for the "Bottle Bill"

I was honored to speak in favor of and advocate for the long overdue bottle redemption increase. This law will put money back into the pockets of hardworking residents and help prevent litter from contaminating our streets and drainage systems.



Signing the "PFAS Bill" into Law

When PFAS from Bradley contaminated the Farmington River a few years ago, it devastated our community and local wildlife. This past July, I was proud to stand with fearless environmental advocates and legislative leaders as Governor Lamont signed SB 837 into law.

Making Our Communities Safer

We made outstanding progress this session on addressing gun violence in our state. Public Act 21-67 will block courtdetermined high-risk individuals from obtaining a gun, while Public Act 21-36 provides more sustainable funding to community violence prevention programs.

- Banned no-knock warrants (SB 1093)
