STANDING UP FOR SENIORS

- Required background checks at homemaker-companion agencies (PA 21-37)
- Allowed towns to offer more seniors a break on their property taxes (HB 6458 & PA 21-84)
- Ensured access to virtual visits and monitoring by loved ones for nursing home residents (PA 21-55)
- Strengthened rights for residents of long-term care facilities (PA 21-55)
- Fought age discrimination in the workplace limited the need for your age and other dates on job applications (PA 21-69)
- Reformed nursing home staffing, policies and supply inventories in response to COVID-19 (PA 21-185)

HEALTHCARE

- The House approved lower costs, and greater access, for epi-pens (HB 6587)
- Ensured dental coverage for kids through their parents' plans, up to the age of 26 (PA 21-149)
- Continued coverage for, and access to, telehealth (PA 21-133 & PA 21-9)
- Provided new health care coverage to 40,000 low-income residents and families (PA 21-2) [regardless of immigration status (PA 21-176)]
- Provided better training and tools for police to respond to opioid overdoses (PA 21-108)

- Expanding the hemp industry in CT through licensed medical marijuana providers (PA 21-37)

 - » Erasure of past marijuana convictions
- » Home grow in 2023
- » Majority of state proceeds go to advancing equity and substance abuse treatment
- Legalized sports betting and online gaming (PA 21-23)
- Paved the way for our state's first Inspector General to independently investigate police-involved shootings (PA 21-8)

RESPONDING TO COVID-19

- Cut unemployment insurance taxes on local businesses by excluding pandemic-related layoffs and paying directly into the fund (PA 21-5 & PA 21-2)
- Ensured legal representation if you're facing eviction (PA 21-34)
- Increased protections on homes, cars and bank accounts when someone falls into debt (PA 21-161)
- Strengthened numerous programs designed to keep people from losing their homes during tough times: Foreclosure Mediation, Lien Assistance and Emergency Mortgage Assistance (PA 21-44)
- Increased funding to local health departments (PA 21-2)
- Created an Unemployed Workers' Advocate to assist out-ofwork residents with accessing benefits and getting back to work
- Streamlined workforce initiatives under a new Office of Workforce Strategy and made it easier for residents to know what CT colleges they can easily get into, and what certificate programs are worth taking (PA 21-2)
- Ensuring our kids recover from this pandemic (PA 21-46)
 - » Expanded youth suicide prevention training
 - » Created more outpatient services for kids
 - » Required social emotional learning as part of professional development for teachers
 - » Continued virtual parent-teacher conferences
 - » Ended lunch shaming when kids fall behind in paying for their school lunches
