We made the biggest tax cuts in CT's history to put more money back into your pockets, established a fully funded, first-of-its-kind mental health program to ensure that all of our kids are safe and have the resources they need, and offered additional relief to local businesses and restaurants so they can keep their doors open despite facing numerous challenges throughout the pandemic.

Our work this session will make life easier for you, even in the face of historically high inflation rates. Connecticut is in the best financial shape of the past 22 years. Our financial standing has been upgraded by the prestigious credit rating agencies of Standards and Poors, Fitch and Moody's, which saves the state interest when we must borrow money. Our reserve fund is at a historic high.

I successfully fought to secure funding for East Hartford in Fiscal Year 2023-the town will see an increase of millions of dollars, which will provide relief for property taxes.
