EDUCATION

The federal budget proposal includes troubling cuts to programs that Danbury students rely on. \$25 million in federal funding to Connecticut for class-size reduction and teacher development efforts would be eliminated. Danbury has received almost \$300,000 from this program this fiscal year.

I strongly oppose federal cuts to vulnerable children. I will continue to advocate for a fairer state education funding system so that cities like Danbury receive the aid they deserve and need. Connecticut's courts have ruled that our current education cost sharing formula is unfair, and I agree. We must fix it.

ENVIRONMENT

The federal administration has proposed drastically slashing the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) budget, which would mean fewer protections for clean air and water.

Danbury residents have benefitted from EPA regulations through a cleaner Still River. Once heavily polluted, the river has made a great recovery.

HEALTH CARE ACCESS

Recently the U.S. House of Representatives passed legislation to replace the federal health care law, the Affordable Care Act (ACA or Obamacare). Access Health CT, Connecticut's health insurance exchange, is reminding exchange members that they still have access to their regular health care coverage.

Currently, 7,055 Danbury residents – our neighbors – have health insurance through the ACA. If passed, the federal proposal could threaten the insurance coverage of people enrolled with Access Health CT or the expanded Medicaid program.

The proposal would cut \$880 billion in Medicaid funding for Connecticut, costs which it would likely be impossible for the state to cover.
