The pandemic has produced numerous challenges and exacerbated existing institutional inequities. Throughout the 2021 session, my colleagues and I worked to address these new challenges and the existing injustices by passing over 350 bills and resolutions.

I know the past year has been difficult for each individual and family in our community, and I believe the legislation passed will empower everyone in our district. This session I championed the following legislation: Ban on No Knock Warrants; put community violence prevention programs on a path to sustainable funding and growth in our state - to serve more victims of gun violence and their families; repealed the poverty tax to stop the state from taking back cash and medical assistance when individuals fight their way out of poverty and instituted Community Investment Fund (which allocates \$2 billion for needed projects in communities like ours). I also worked with my colleagues to pass a bipartisan budget that will strengthen our economy and invest in our infrastructure, sustainability efforts, and education. I have fought to ensure the city of Hartford will see an increase in funding in both Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023 through this budget. I am confident that these state investments will see our community recover and thrive as we move out of this pandemic.

A DEMOCRACY THAT WORKS FOR ALL OF US

- Voters will get to decide in 2022 if we should have early, in-person voting and in 2024 you'll decide if every registered voter in CT should be able to vote by absentee ballot
- Ended prison gerrymandering the practice of counting prisoners as if they were registered voters when determining what districts our elected officials represent
- Restored voting rights for individuals in community facilities or on parole
- Guaranteed two hours off from work to vote in state and federal elections



HEALTHCARE

- Put community violence prevention programs on a path to sustainable funding and growth in our state - to serve more victims of gun violence and their families
- Ensured dental coverage for kids through their parents' plans, up to the age of 26
- Continued coverage for, and access to, telehealth
- Provided new health care coverage to 40,000 low-income residents and families regardless of immigration status
- Expanded workers' comp benefits for PTSD to cover emergency responders, corrections workers, dispatchers and front-line health care providers who were on the front lines of the COVID-19 pandemic

PUTTING SENIORS, WORKING FAMILIES, AND CHILDREN FIRST

- Repealed the poverty tax to stop the state from taking back cash and medical assistance when individuals fight their way out of poverty
- Increased the state's earned income tax credit, providing tax credits for qualifying working families with children
- Fully funded free community college meaning students can work on their Associate Degree without having to pay tuition out of pocket
- Allowed student athletes to make money from their name, image and likeness
- Allowed towns to offer more seniors a break on their property taxes
- Strengthened rights for residents of long-term care facilities
- Fought age discrimination in the workplace limited the need for your age and other dates on job applications
- Lowered prescription drug costs by requiring manufacturing discounts go to the consumer and not the insurance company
- New Utility Protections for Residential Customers •
- Raised awareness of child sex abuse and required comprehensive . background checks at athletic leagues and youth camps
- Added Native American studies to the public school curriculum •
- Ensuring our kids recover from this pandemic •
 - o Expanded youth suicide prevention training
 - Created more outpatient services for kids 0
 - 0 Required social emotional learning as part of professional development for teachers
 - o Continued virtual parent teacher conferences
 - o Addressed absenteeism in virtual learning
 - o Ended lunch shaming when kids fall behind in paying for their school lunches
- Established the National Purple Star School Program to assist military families with school registration, planning, counseling and other support services
- Directed state colleges and universities to update what credits they can . award based on military training



THE FIGHT FOR RACIAL AND **GENDER EQUALITY**

- Passed Clean Slate legislation that erases most misdemeanor crimes after 7 years and some lesser felonies after 10 years
- Ended the practice of charging prisoners to use the phone
- Declared racism a public health crisis and created a Commission on Racial Equity tasked with eliminating health disparities
- CT joined seven states in making it illegal to discriminate based on hair texture and protective hairstyle ("CROWN ACT")
- Paved the way for our state's first Inspector General to independently investigate police-involved shootings
- Legalized Adult Use of Cannabis for those 21 and older. Majority of State proceeds would be for advancing equity and substance abuse treatment.
- Strengthened our domestic violence laws and ensured immediate cash assistance for victims and their families
- Blocked individuals whom a court determines as high-risk from getting their hands on a gun
- Required employers to provide a salary range for job openings making sure you don't waste your time on jobs that won't pay the bills; and that your salary negotiations are based on what the job is worth, not what you've been paid in the past
- Ensured domestic workers get upfront information on the terms of their employment and established a new education and training program
- Allocated funding to the Connecticut Women's Business Development Council, which provides support and resources for women and minority-owned businesses throughout our state.

HOUSING COSTS AND **FAIRNESS**

- Championed new zoning reforms to deal with rising housing costs and address affordability, equity and opportunity in our communities
- House Democrats fought for guaranteed walkthroughs for renters before they sign their lease and capped fees for being late on rent payments

- Strengthened numerous programs designed to keep people from losing their homes during tough times: Foreclosure Mediation, Lien Assistance and Emergency Mortgage Assistance

• House Democrats fought to expand the Small Business Express Program to help more local businesses grow and expand minority, women, veteran, and disabled-owned businesses

• Launched a new anti-bias in hiring initiative in public schools

- Guaranteed legal representation if you're facing eviction
- Invested resources to clean up and make our public housing more energy efficient
