It is an honor to serve you in the legislature. This year's legislative session wrapped up in June and I am pleased to share some exciting new laws that will help to make Connecticut a better place to work, live and raise a family.

The town of Windham will receive significant funding under the state budget that Governor Lamont signed into law in June. State funds, along with federal funds coming from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) will help Windham eliminate any deficit, keep a lid on local property tax increases, and ensure our town can continue to maintain a budget reserve. The federal funds in particular are a onetime infusion of funds in response to the pandemic and our local officials must use the funds in accordance with COVID-19 expenses that have been incurred and may still be a problem.

WINDHAM BUDGET BREAKDOWN

This session the legislature passed a \$46.4 billion bipartisan biennium budget. The budget that was passed includes a \$2.3 billion surplus that is strong on not raising taxes, offers relief from the ravages of COVID-19, helps jumpstart our economy and invests in our cities and towns.

The 2022-2023 budget:

- 1. Rejects tax hikes on gasoline, insurance policies and large Connecticut home properties;
- 2. Includes tax relief for restaurants and allows certain restaurants to retain a portion of collected sales tax during a specified period of time;
- 3. Increases the state's earned income tax credit (EITC) to 30.5% of the federal credit. During the 2019 fiscal year, 2,235 Windham residents filed for the EITC. If the credit for that year was at 30.5% of the federal EITC, \$1,601,238 would have gone back to residents;
- 4. Eliminates the admissions tax as of July 1, 2021 for participating colleges and universities:
- 5. Maintains our historic balance in the state's \$3.5 billion Rainy-Day Fund;
- 6. Increases town aid and fairly funds Education Cost Sharing (ECS) for Windham:
- 7. Expands healthcare for 40,000 expectant mothers, families, and lowincome adults through the "Covered Connecticut" initiative which will provide insurance to individuals who are not covered by HUSKY but are under 175% of the federal poverty line;
- 8. Expands workforce training so that we can get people back to work;
- 9. Fully funds free community college for eligible first-time and full-time students; and
- 10. Includes grants available for arts, culture and tourism.

STATE FUNDING FOR WINDHAM HIGH SCHOOL RENOVATION

This session, the legislature passed the school bonding bill which included an increased state reimbursement from 80% to 95% to renovate Windham High School as new. Windham voters approved \$112 million. The state's bonding increase will save Windham taxpayers more than \$15 million.

2021 MEDICARE SAVINGS PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

The budget we negotiated ensures that the Medicare Savings Program (MSP) will be fully funded. MSP helps low-income elderly individuals and the disabled pay for the cost of medicine and healthcare premiums. The income eligibility limits are detailed in the chart below:
