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GETTING M.O.R.E. FOR YOUR TAX MONEY

We must think differently about how we are structured and how we perform municipal functions and that is why I am honored to be appointed by House Speaker Sharkey to the Municipal Opportunities & Regional Efficiencies (M.O.R.E) Commission. We studied government operations and made recommendations to reduce costs and save taxpayer dollars. We created new opportunities for cities and towns to connect each municipality and regional Council of Government (COG) planning authority to the state-wide high speed data network. To further help municipalities, the new law also established the Municipal Reimbursement and Revenue Account (MRRA) to help stabilize their finances and budgets.

CHILDREN'S BEHAVIORAL SERVICES

The new initiatives in early childhood behavioral health services are part of the gun violence prevention and child school safety measures passed earlier this year.

This new law is focused on reducing mental, emotional and behavioral health issues in children through early identification and intervention. Public Act 13-178 promotes better coordination of home visitation programs that offer services to vulnerable families with young children; orders a study of incarcerated youth with mental health issues; creates a public education campaign and a Children's Mental Health Task Force.

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING HELPS MAKE CONNECTICUT SCHOOLS SAFER FROM GUN VIOLENCE

Our communities are safer when we ensure that everyone in Connecticut has access to the behavioral health care that they or a family member may need.

The new law increases intensive care coordination services for students with persistent behavioral issues. It increases case management in probate courts.

Pediatricians will be able to consult with mental health professionals to help pinpoint children in need of behavioral health services at an early age. Schools will be able to offer training to teachers during in-service days to help them identify students who may be struggling with behavioral health issues and get them the help they need.

BETTER PUBLIC HEALTH

I am honored to continue working on important health care policy in my new position as House Chair of the Legislature's Public Health Committee. The committee has oversight of the CT Departments of Public Health (DPH), Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS) and Developmental Services (DDS).

- The Council on Medical Assistance Program Oversight ensures people have access and receive the Medicaid benefits they are entitled to.
