### **ELECTIONS AND VOTING**

- Requires municipalities to video record absentee ballot drop boxes during elections and release recordings to the public
- Tracks how town clerks receive absentee ballots (mail, drop box, or in person)
- Limits the number of applications a person may request 90 days or more before an election and requires application forms to expire at the end of each year
- Prohibits foreign nationals from making contributions or expenditures to campaigns
- Allows emergency absentee ballots to be issued to voters in nursing homes

# **MAJOR INITIATIVES AFFECTING WETHERSFIELD**

## **EARLY CHILDHOOD**

### **HEALTH OF RESIDENTS**

- Requires programs receiving financial assistance under Early Start CT to be accredited and sets a schedule for requiring certain qualifications for designated staff members
- Sets up and administers a wage supplement payment program that provides one-time payments of at least \$1,800 to over 4,200 eligible early childhood education teachers and assistants
- Allows Connecticut state agencies to more easily enroll qualifying children and parents into federal nutrition assistance programs and promotes outreach and education
- Expands Paid Sick Days to cover almost all employees by 2027
- Continues pandemic era telehealth policies
- Establishes a new category of THC product "infused beverage" and prohibits the sale of these beverages to anyone under age 21, limiting where they can be sold

# **OUR SENIORS**

- Makes it easier for seniors to age in place by providing a home care provider registry and requiring home care workers to wear an ID badge for better identification
- Creates a nursing home database, providing a reliable way to compare locations and services
- Establishes incentives to encourage nursing homes to improve their level of care

# SAFETY

- Requires disclosure of intentionally added PFAS in products with a ban of intentionally added PFAS by 2028
- Restarts DOT's work zone speed camera program
- Allows municipalities to adopt automated traffic enforcement in certain instances
- Addresses the safety of home health care workers and creates a program to provide safety escorts and purchase technology for staff safety checks
