- Creates a Child Tax Credit
- Cuts property taxes for retirees
- Cuts the car tax
- Extends the gas tax cut
- Extends free bus service
- Ends pension and annuity tax
- Invests in healthcare workers

LARGEST TAX CUT IN STATE HISTORY

- Cut taxes by over \$650 million
- Increased state income tax credit for property owners from \$200 to \$300
- Increased the Earned Income Tax Credit for the 2023 tax year, cutting taxes for our needlest families
- Eliminated pension and annuity taxes for retirees making less than \$75k/year
- Secured one-time childcare rebate of \$250 per child, up to three children
- Cut state gas tax to zero through December 1, 2022

STILL FIGHTING: BILLS FOR NEXT SESSION

- SB 250 AN ACT CONCERNING STUDENT LOAN REIMBURSEMENT FOR CONNECTICUT RESIDENTS WHO GRADUATED FROM A STATE UNIVERSITY.
- We were very close to passing SB 250, which would have created a student loan debt reimbursement program for Connecticut college students who stay in state after graduation. I am encouraged by our progress and will continue to work with advocates and colleagues to address this critical issue that impacts our individual and collective economic futures.

IMPROVING ACCESS TO QUALITY HEALTH CARE (HB 5506)

- Allowed pharmacists, in collaboration with your doctor, to adjust more medications without requiring as many in-person visits
- Made \$12M available for tobacco prevention and cessation
- Expanded screenings for breast and cervical cancer
- Ensured more psychiatric treatment beds
- Created new home visit pilot program for newborns
- Continued telehealth options









RESPONDING TO THE CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS (HB 5001, SB 1, HB 5506)

- Provided grants to local schools to hire more support staff, including in the areas of mental health: social workers, psychologists, and counselors
- · Created new walk-ins for mental health emergencies
- Initiated new position at the Healthcare Advocate to help families navigate care for children and adolescents
- Expanded 24/7 emergency mental health response
- Established state oversight and coordination of state response to kids' mental health needs
- Provided mental health training to parents, students, and pediatricians

MAKING CT MORE EQUITABLE

- Required the teaching of Asian American and Pacific Islander studies in public schools (SB 1)
- Required most publicly owned facilities to provide free menstrual products (HB 5506)
- Increased health care coverage to undocumented immigrants, up to age 12 (HB 5506)
- Required towns with over 25,000 residents to establish a local fair rent commission. These commissions will respond to tenant complaints about excessively harsh rent increases and lack of code enforcement by a landlord or property manager (HB 5205)
- Established June 19th as Juneteenth Independence Day. This
 new state holiday will forever celebrate the independence of
 African Americans freed from slavery (SB 350)
- Honor our commitment to body cameras, police accountability and our new clean state laws
