BIG WINS FOR MERIDEN

- · Largest tax cuts in CT history

MAJOR INITIATIVES AFFECTING MERIDEN

STANDING UP FOR CT CONSUMERS

- Restricted more types of telemarketing calls, texts, and social media solicitations and limited the hours that telemarketing can take place
- Demanded TV and cable companies give you a prorated refund if you cancel before the end of your billing cycle
- Responded to inflation by freezing scheduled increases on the diesel tax- helping lower the cost of groceries and other commodities

BUILDING A SKILLED WORKFORCE

- Expanded school-based apprenticeship opportunities in aviation and aerospace, training for future paraeducators, and dual credit/enrollment opportunities
- Created tax credits and incentives for towns and businesses that build workforce housing, including for teachers, police officers, and firefighters
- Encouraging careers in our K-12 schools, offering nursing licenses at our colleges, and creating opportunities among our existing personal care attendant workforce

INVESTING IN EDUCATION

- Over \$240 million in public education funding for the 2024-2025 school year
- \$7.2 million in new funding for vocational agriculture programs
- Created student loan subsidies for paraeducators and school counselors in our lowest-performing districts, for police officers in distressed municipalities and for emergency medical service personnel

IMPROVING HEALTHCARE

- Expanded pharmacy services to include vaccine administration of CDC immunizations, testing for COVID, flu, and HIV, and providing prescriptions for preventative HIV treatment
- Expanded workers' comp coverage for anyone who experiences PTSD at work
- Established funding and benefits for firefighters who are diagnosed with cancer
