

OUR BIPARTISAN BUDGET INCLUDES

PROTECTING TAX CUTS

WE PASSED A BIPARTISAN BIENNIUM BUDGET THAT INCLUDES HISTORIC TAX CUTS AND INVESTMENTS FOR OUR COMMUNITY.

- LARGEST INCOME TAX CUT in state history
- Biggest investment in public education ever
- New supports for the IDD community
- Expansion of debt free community college
- Protected safety net programs

THIS SESSION WE PROTECTED THESE TAX CUTS AND INVESTED MILLIONS OF FEDERAL FUNDS IN:

- Higher Education \$160 million with a path to grow to \$200 million
- Early Childcare \$21.8 million
- Mental Health \$24 million
- Nonprofits \$50 million

PROTECTING DEMOCRACY

- Banned foreign nationals from making campaign contributions in CT or spending money on behalf of candidates (SB 253)
- Required video monitoring of ballot drop boxes (PA 24-148)
- Made it a crime to harass election workers (PA 24-148)

MAKING CT SENIORS A PRIORITY

- Expedited Medicaid coverage for home-based care as an alternative to more costly nursing home care (PA 24-39)
- Required home care workers to wear photo-ID badges (PA 24-39)
- Prevented nursing homes from putting more than two patients in a single room (PA 24-141)
- Required health insurance coverage for detecting coronary artery disease (PA 24-19)

IMPROVING HIGHER EDUCATION

- Expanded state-backed student loans to students under 18 (PA 24-64)
- Required CT colleges and universities to disclose to students any reductions in their financial aid when they are awarded a scholarship (PA 24-87)
- Expanded employer-based student loan repayment tax credits and reduced rates for state-backed loans for indemand occupations (PA 24-52)









SUPPORTING LOCAL SCHOOLS

- Established the Education Mandate Review Advisory Council to review proposed and existing mandates on local boards of education (PA 24-45)
- Required same day parental notification when a child hurts themself or others (PA 24-93)
- Capped the amount of money all districts pay to send kids out of district – saving millions of dollars for local schools (PA 24-81)
- Required the State Department of Education to provide school districts an estimate of their next year's funding by the end of the current year, to ensure better budgeting (PA 24-81)
- Provided help to classroom paraeducators to pay for their health insurance (PA 24-81)
- Improving Childcare (PAs 24-78 & -91):
 - Increased coordination to raise private funds
 - · Piloted new childcare programming
 - Expanded the childcare incubator program

KEEPING OUR COMMUNITIES SAFE

- Improved the eligibility process for getting benefits to the families of first responders who died in the line of duty (PA 24-16)
- Established a Fallen Officer Fund to provide families of police officers who died in the line of duty with cash assistance and health care coverage (PA 24-27)
- Required more thorough testing of firearms in criminal investigations with the use of the federal ballistic database (PA 24-32)
- Protected the personal information of special victims like minors and victims of abuse from public disclosures (PA 24-56)
- Toughened penalties for killing a police dog (PA 24-65)
