SUPPORTING OUR CHILDREN

- My proposed bill, that was successfully passed and signed into law, makes CT the first state in the U.S. to pass a law that bans handcuffs on children who are under the age of
- This bill raises the age for arrest of a child under certain circumstances, from 10 to 12 years in 2026, and from 12 to 14 years in 2028. It also restricts the use of handcuffs on children under 14 years of age.

FOUNDING THE END HOMELESSNESS CAUCUS

- Established to explore policies necessary to address the complex factors contributing to homelessness and work toward its eradication.
- Secured \$13.5 million for homeless services and \$6.7 million for the Rental Assistance Program (RAP).
- Established an Interagency Council on Homelessness to address and prevent homelessness in CT.









MAKING OUR COMMUNITIES STRONGER

- Prevented people from being foreclosed on for small, missed sewer payments.
- Increased the reimbursement homebuyers get when their contractor goes bankrupt and cannot repay them.
- Prevented condo associations from prohibiting homeowners from installing solar panels on their detached
- Made it easier for towns to enforce housing code violations.
- Reduced red tape for converting vacant commercial property to housing.
- Required developers to finish their work in a timely manner, rather than leaving projects half-finished for years.

INVESTING IN OUR KIDS AND STUDENTS

Our budget is the single greatest investment in children in Connecticut's history:

- Established an investable trust to provide sustainable
- funding for new childcare programs.
 Provided historic new funding for special education.
 \$30 million annually for a new Special Education Expansion and Development (SEED) grant to districts.
- \$10 million in competitive grants for more in-district programming.
- \$221 million in annual reimbursement for special education
- \$10 million in financing for capital projects related to special
