


2007 Legislative **Session Preview**

WHAT'S NEW THIS SESSION?

Thousands of bills are introduced each year in the Connecticut General Assembly. Here are some of the initiatives the legislature is considering this session.

Education

- Increase state funding for local education
- Restore separate state reimbursement grants for special education



- Perform security assessments on school buildings
- Establish or update crisis management plans
- Provide special state aid for districts to hire and train security personnel
- Install security devices, such as portable metal detectors, security cameras, and alarms
- Broaden the school bullying law
 - Redefine "bullying" to cover more situations and to extend its reach to incidents that occur off school grounds and in cyberspace
 - Require school districts to publish bullying complaints more widely or report complaints to the state
 - Change curriculum to discourage student violence and promote positive behavior.
- Provide remedial help and alternative programs for schools facing sanctions under the federal No Child Left Behind law.

- Increase space and quality of school readiness programs for low-income children in inner-cities
- Provide better preschool facilities
- Reduce the drop-out rate, improve student attendance, and reduce suspension and expulsion rates

Juvenile Justice

Last session we established the Juvenile Jurisdiction Planning and Implementation Committee. I am chair of this committee, and I can attest to the fact that thorough investigations of current policy have been conducted.

These findings have been studied and we have made the following recommendations:

- Raise the juvenile court's age limit from 15 to 16 or 17
- Ensure that state agencies use evidence-based programs as the foundation for mental health and education services for adolescents

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Health Care/Insurance

Public

- Expand existing public programs to allow more adults to participate
- Allocate more resources into safety net providers through community health centers and school-based health centers
- Offer premium assistance to residents who have access to employer-sponsored coverage

Private

- Fund reinsurance programs to reduce the price of private insurance
- Provide tax incentives to encourage people to purchase insurance
- Mandate that employers offer coverage or face a financial penalty

Facilities

 Boost state appropriation to UConn Medical Center for rising costs such as upgrading equipment
