CAPITOL UPDATE 2024



HELPING SENIORS & VETERANS

- Exempted permanently and totally disabled veterans from paying property taxes. (PA 24-46)
- Expedited Medicaid coverage for homebased care as an alternative to more costly nursing home care. (PA 24-39)
- Created a new registry system to connect patients to home care providers and created a dashboard to help navigate nursing home options. (PA 24-39)
- Required nursing homes and retirement communities to provide at least 60-90 days notice of any fee increases and improved transparency around fees. (PA 24-141)
- Strengthened oversight of negligent nursing homes. (PA 24-141)





PROTECTING CONSUMERS

- Expanded the state's investigative powers to enforce banking laws. (PA 24-74)
- Approved new consumer protections regarding cryptocurrencies. (PA 24-146)
- Protected domestic violence victims from being forced into debt by their abuser. (PA 24-77)
- Made it easier to access the state's emergency mortgage assistance program. (PA 24-66)
- Excluded medical debt from counting against your credit score. (PA 24-6)
- Cut red tape when it comes to getting wheelchairs repaired. (PA 24-58)
- Added greater transparency and local input to Siting Council process. (PA-144)



SUPPORTING LOCAL SCHOOLS, KIDS, & FAMILIES

- Preserved local education funding from proposed cuts. Capped the amount of money all districts pay to send kids out of district saving millions of dollars for local schools. (PA 24-81)
- Required the State Department of Education to provide school districts an estimate of their next year's funding by the end of the current year, to ensure better budgeting. (PA 24-81)
- Provided help to classroom paraeducators to pay for their health insurance. (PA 24-81)
- Established the Mandate Review Advisory Council to review proposed and existing mandates on local Boards of Education. (PA 24-45)
- Improving childcare by creating new programming and increasing coordination with employers. (PA 24-78 & 24-91)
- Paid sick leave for all workers. (PA 24-8)



OUR BIPARTISAN BUDGET PROTECTS

BRINGING HOME LOCAL FUNDING FOR MANCHESTER AND GLASTONBURY

IN 2023, WE PASSED A BIPARTISAN BIENNIUM BUDGET THAT INCLUDES HISTORIC TAX CUTS AND INVESTMENTS FOR OUR COMMUNITY.
