PUTTING YOUR HEALTH & SAFETY FIRST

- Strengthened protection for victims of domestic violence by prohibiting insurance companies from charging them more (PA 21-93), expanding definition to include coercive control as a form of domestic violence, and ensuring immediate cash assistance for victims and their families (PA 21-78)
- Blocked individuals that a court determines as high-risk from getting their hands on a gun (PA 21-67)
- Funded evidence-based programs preventing gun violence and supporting victims and their families (PA 21-36)
- Required smoke detectors in older homes (PA 21-165)
- Expanded workers' comp benefits for PTSD to cover emergency responders, corrections workers, dispatchers and health care providers who were on the front lines of the COVID-19 pandemic (PA 21-107)
- Improved mental health first aid training for paramedics (PA 21-134)
- Increased property tax breaks for volunteer firefighters and other first responders (PA 21-83)
- Lowered prescription drug costs by requiring manufacturing discounts go to the consumer and not the insurance company (PA 21-14)
- Continued coverage for, and access to, telehealth (PA 21-133 and PA 21-9)
- Ensured dental coverage for kids through their parents' plans, up to the age of 26 (PA 21-149)

A GREENER CONNECTICUT

- Raised bottle deposits to 10 cents, applied deposits to more products and provided more money to towns and redemption centers to ensure these products don't wind up as litter or in a landfill (PA 21-58)

The pandemic brought many challenges to the Northwest Corner and communities throughout the state, often exacerbating existing inequities. Throughout the 2021 session, my colleagues and I worked to address these new challenges head on by passing more than 350 bills and resolutions.

This term I chaired the Public Safety & Security Committee and served on the Environment and Energy & Technology Committees, which focused much of my work, including bills touching on consumer protection, resources for mental health & addiction, recycling, and broadband. Beyond my committee work, I advocated for equitable public health policies, criminal justice reform, as well as additional support for our seniors, schools, and small businesses. I worked with my colleagues to pass a bipartisan budget that will strengthen our economy and invest in our infrastructure, sustainability efforts, and education. And I have fought to ensure the Northwest Corner will see an increase in funding in both Fiscal Years 2022 and 2023 through this budget. I am confident that these state investments, which include additional resources for our community nonprofits, will see our communities recover and thrive as we move out of this pandemic.

- Voters will get to decide in 2022 if we should have early, in-person voting and in 2024 you'll decide if every registered voter in CT should be able to vote by absentee ballot (PA 21-1 and PA 21-2)
