


- ❖ Public education agencies were created under State Statute 10-66 –a-p. for the main purpose of "cooperative action to furnish programs and services" to public school districts.
- *RESCs are considered LEAs
- Membership is voluntary yet all districts in CT are members. RESCs are also not restricted to working with school districts only
- Locally governed by member districts through board of education representation

Unique Cost Savings Programs

- Flexible in creating, adapting, or phasing-out programs as appropriate
- Flexible in staffing
- RESCs can hire consultants in science, math or literacy to support and help develop capacity within districts

- ❖ RESC Directors meet frequently with the Commissioner of Education and CSDE staff
- RESCs host regional meetings for Superintendents, Assistant Superintendents, Special Education Directors and other district support personnel
- **❖ A RESC** Director serves on the Board of Directors for CAPSS

- Cost savings through RESCs' multi-district programs
- Support to Alliance Districts and Turn-Around Schools
- **❖ Teacher/Administrator Evaluation Reform**
- Quality instructional and support services as needed



Benefits to School Districts and Communities


Compliance with mandates are difficult for a single district to implement Examples include: Fingerprinting and TEAM

- Technology support to municipalities




- RESCs are supported by their entrepreneurial sale of service programs
