GROWING CONNECTICUT'S ECONOMY

- Lowered the business tax rate for unemployment insurance, effectively making the federal loan repayment for the coming year on behalf of businesses
- Expanded the successful Manufacturing Pipeline program
- Established the JobsCT program – helping companies in target industries earn rebates against insurance premiums and state taxes for meeting job targets
- Invested in local nonprofits, museums, and other attractions
- Allowed high school graduates to access low-interest loans for attending occupational training programs

STOPPING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

- Took action steps to make online dating safer
- Created a grant program to prevent online abuse
- Expanded anti-discrimination provisions to all employers regardless of the number of employees
- Established a protected class for victims of domestic violence

SERVING THOSE WHO SERVE US

- Guaranteed CT veterans in-state tuition rates
- Provided funding to local volunteer fire departments who respond to emergencies on certain state highways
- Established a new, local-option property tax exemption equal to 10% of home values for more veterans
- Created new license plates for veterans who served in Afghanistan or Iraq

RESPONDING TO THE KIDS' MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS

- Provided grants to local schools to hire more support staff, especially in the areas of mental health: social workers, psychologists, and counselors
- Created new walk-in centers for mental health emergencies
- Initiated a new position at the Healthcare Advocate to help families navigate care for children and adolescents
- Expanded 24/7 emergency mental health response
- Established state oversight and coordination of state response to kids' mental health needs
- Helped school-based health centers develop new mental health programming
- Assisted local schools in expanded mental health staff and access to care
- Provided mental health training to parents, students, and pediatricians



LARGEST TAX CUTS IN RECENT HISTORY

- ✓ More than \$650 million in tax cuts
- ✓ Creates a Child Tax Credit (applications being accepted from now through July 31st)
- ✓ Cuts property taxes for retirees
- ✓ Cuts the car tax
- ✓ Extends the gas tax cut
- ✓ Extends free bus service
- ✓ Ends pension and annuity tax
- ✓ Invests in healthcare workers

MAKING CT MORE EQUITABLE

- Established June 19th as Juneteenth Independence Day
- Required the teaching of Asian American and Pacific Islander studies in public schools
- Increased health care coverage to undocumented immigrants, up to age 12
- Created a Hate Crimes Investigation Unit within the State Police, while also improving data collection, reporting, and information sharing between departments



MODERNIZING STATE GOVERNMENT

- Revised the absentee voting eligibility status to make it easier for voters to vote absentee if:
 - » They are feeling unwell or have a physical disability
 - » They are worried about their health, or will be out of town on Election Day
- Authorized cybersecurity upgrades to protect our elections
- Funded a robust contracting standards board for more oversight
- Leveraged new federal funding for community-based programming and substance abuse treatment

ACCESS TO QUALITY HEALTHCARE

- Expanded screenings for breast and cervical cancer
- Made \$12M available for tobacco prevention and cessation
- Ensured more psychiatric treatment beds
- Allowed pharmacists, in collaboration with doctors, to adjust more medications without requiring as many in-person visits
