

ELECTRICITY


Energy reform delivers \$780 million in savings for ratepayers and reduces unnecessary costs

- Restructures how key energy programs are funded
- Updates energy procurement to lock in savings
- Shifts the cost of public benefit programs onto state bonds
- Modernizes the electric grid
- Pays storm costs over a longer period
- Better transmission planning and transparency
- Invests in long-term clean energy solutions

FIREARM RESPONSIBILITY ACT

Holds the firearm industry accountable for negligent practices, misuse of products, and sales to prohibited individuals that contribute to gun violence.

- Legal recourse for victims of gun violence
- "Reasonable controls" to prevent the sale or distribution of firearms to individuals prohibited from possessing them
- Prevents individuals with out-of-state misdemeanor convictions from obtaining Connecticut permits
- Allows the Attorney General to file civil suits against the firearm industry









SPECIAL EDUCATION

A more equitable and efficient system for special education while controlling rising and unpredictable costs, increasing funding, enhancing oversight, and improving the quality and delivery of services

- \$30 million special education expansion grant for schools
- Revised cost definitions and stronger reporting requirements
- Address teacher shortages through the new grant program for prospective educators and paraeducators
- Prohibits cost increases from private providers and defines "reasonable costs"
- Oversight and accountability
- Focus on early childhood education and access to childcare

ENVIRONMENT

Priority legislation taking a comprehensive, practical, and equitable approach to protecting the environment – from homes and schools to jobs and land, we set clear goals, removed barriers, and put residents first.

- New state climate goals for greenhouse gas reduction
- Clean energy jobs through tax incentives
- Encourages the use of heat pumps through strategic planning and local school building projects
- Expands the ban on the sales of invasive species
- Regulates the use of rodenticides and neonicotinoids
- Bans fertilizers containing PFAS
- Grants for agricultural land preservation and support for local
- Land and grant programs to offer more benefits to low-income residents
- Continues to preserve and protect our natural resources and reduce the effects of climate change
